



Dear Brothers and

in Christ,

It is not easy to think about the Easter season when it is so very cold

and there is snow on the ground. Yet, ready or not, the Easter season, Lent, is beginning on February 13. February 13 is Ash Wednesday. It is true, calendar wise, Ash Wednesday is early this year. Through the years Ash Wednesday has been earlier, but not by much. February 4th is the earliest Lent can begin. Of course the date of Ash Wednesday has everything to do with the date of Easter. Since Easter is early this year, too, March 31, that makes Ash Wednesday come early.

Lent is a season of 40 week days and six Sundays and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the word lencten, which means "spring". The season is a preparation for celebrating Easter. Historically, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by converts and then became a time of confessing sins and seeking forgiveness by all Christians. Lent is a time to get closer to God. Lent is a journey from self-serving to self-giving. People may give up something they enjoy for Lent or fast for certain meals. Others give up a favorite activity, like watching television or internet browsing.

Recently I read a book entitled Give Up Something Bad for Lent by James W. Moore. The author suggests that instead of giving up something for Lent, like desserts, we consider giving up something bad, something that keeps us from being all God has called us to be, such as jealousy, apathy, bitterness, anger, gossip, etc. with the hope we will be able to give it up long term, not just for the season of Lent. Personally I think he is on to something. If one of the hopes of the Lenten season is that we will be able to get closer to God, what better way than to be obedient to God by getting rid of the things that can cause harm to us and to others.

Lent is an invitation to "be with Jesus," to seek His

face and enjoy His presence and to revel in His amazing love. I encourage you to make the Lenten season a time to begin or renew or deepen your relationship with our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. We invite you to join us for our Ash Wednesday Service at 7:30pm on February 13, at the Oakland United Church of Christ and our Sunday morning worship services at the Oakland UMC at 10am. Let us join together to spiritually prepare for Easter. There is nothing more important than drawing closer to the One who loves you so much that He gave His only Son to die for you so that you may have life and have it abundantly!

THE ROAD TO JSS (JUNIOR SECONDARY SCHOOL)

About one mile off the Numan/Jalingo Highway, a road...well, that's not exactly the right word to describe it...leads into JSS where the United Methodist sponsored high school is located. This road is rough, full of potholes which have standing water during the rainy season, has no shoulders, is full of deep gulley's where erosion has taken place, has no culverts for run off thus making the trek into JSS like being on the slow speed in a blender.

During the school holiday in early September the Jalingo area experienced a deluge so that the road into JSS was not passable. Prior to the resumption of classes staff voluntarily prepared the road so that families could bring their students back to class. They picked up sticks and branches to place in the potholes and filled some with dirt making it possible to get to the campus. Staff has a daily challenge to get to school as they rendezvous in Jalingo and are taken six miles to the school on a daily basis but have a ardous trek over this road into JSS.

Low areas of the campus were muddy and water logged causing a soggy mess for students to go to/from classes to the dorms. Because of the deluge experienced by persons in the Jalingo area, the standing water breeds mosquitoes causing several students to come down with malaria. Snakes lose their habitat and one student was bitten by a viper.

Experts have said that unless the drainage issue is addressed at JSS the structures on campus will develop cracks and eventually collapse in the

coming years. The school considers this a serious situation and their number one priority.

Financial support is needed at the Junior Secondary School so contributions are welcome sent through your local church to the Conference Treasurer designated INP, #230, JSS. Prayers for staff and students is encouraged as quality education is provided by Christian staff.

November 15, 2012 at 7:00 p.m.

After prayer concerns and requests, Pastor Karen led the Board in prayer. Chairperson Barb opened the meeting.

Secretary's report: Merlin corrected a line to read that the speakers in the basement "are now working" even though that may be somewhat temporary. Lyle motioned to approve the report as corrected. Merlin seconded the motion and the report was approved as corrected.

Treasurer's report: Dick explained the Treasurer's report. Norma motioned to approve the report and Skip seconded the motion. Report is approved.

Finance Committee: Terry Gleaves reported that the committee is still looking into elevator options and will meet again before the end of the year.

Trustees: Pastor Karen reported that a few repairs were made at the church in the Youth room and also a few tiles were replaced.

Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee: Bernie reported that the committee had met earlier this evening to discuss the retirement of Gordon Frizzell. Dick and Jo Kates are willing to try the position of church custodian for a 90 day trial period to see if it works for them and also for the church. Bernie motioned that the Board approve a 90 day trial period with pay for Dick and Jo Kates as custodians. Skip seconded the motion and the Board unanimously passed the motion. A potluck dinner to honor Gordon is also being planned.

Pastor's Report:

Calendar:

The RCA Thanksgiving meal is this Sunday (Nov. 18th) at 6:00.

Nov. 21st - Pastor will give a Thanksgiving sermon at the Senior Center

Nov. 29th - Pastor will attend a Healthy Church Initiative meeting in Harlan and would like others to join her.

Youth:

During November, the youth have been collecting food from area communities for the Food Pantry.

In December, the youth will make, decorate and deliver cookies.

Lay Leader: Merlin reported that the sound system in the basement is on its last leg and while searching out repairs found that Radio Shack has a 30w amplifier that could be hardwired to work for the basement. The cost is around \$100. When the current system dies, that may be a better alternative. Merlin also reported that there is a need for locks on the doors for the English classrooms so that computers and supplies can be safely left unpacked. It will save about 15 minutes on each side of the class if these supplies can remain setup between classes. The Board approved allowing Gordon to purchase 3 new locking doorknobs to install on the English classrooms. Child care was also a concern but is being handled by Mr. Ruhle.

Missions Committee: Mischa reported that November was Ingathering month and that is done. December, the mission will be Shoe Box Angels and she is working on that. It is undecided what their mission will be in January, but the committee will meet to come up with next year's plan.

Peggy will contact Tammie Shellberg to see if she has any interest in painting the old ones to be used next year.

Healthy Church Initiative: Pastor passed out a bulletin on the Health Church Initiative that Ed Kail would like us to participate in. Pastor will be attending a seminar in Harlan on November 29th and she would like a few church members to attend with her.

December 2nd - Caroling and a movie is being planned in conjunction with the Lion's Club chili supper.

January 20th - Planning session with Ed Kail. Ed will preach the sermon and a potluck is being planned for after church.

After discussion - it was decided that the December meeting will not be held due to everyone's busy holiday schedule. If a meeting is needed, it will be called for after church on any given Sunday.

Merlin brought up purchasing meals for needy families in our community at Christmas time. Barb told us about Share Iowa and the service that they provide. It was decided to order 10 meal boxes at \$30 each. Dick will get a check to Barb before Saturday as that is when the order must be placed and paid for. Pastor will get names of needy families through her contacts with other area ministers. Merlin motioned that the above mentioned things be brought to fruition. No Problem!

At that time Jesus said, "I praise you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and learned, and revealed them to little children."

- Matthew 11:25

Grace, our three-year-old granddaughter, melts this grandfather's heart with her generous spirit and exuberance for life.

Over Christmas she was getting into everything, actively exploring Grandma and Grandpa's house, when she found the picture of Loveness on our refrigerator; the little girl from Africa that my wife and I sponsor. "Who is she?" Grace wanted to know. So my wife began to explain it all to her. "Why do you sponsor her?" asked Grace. "Because she is hungry and wouldn't have much to eat, or be able to go to school, or the doctor, if we didn't." "Why don't her parents do that for her?" Grace kept pushing. "Because her parents are poor and can't give her enough to eat."

Then practical Grace set in to solving the problem. "We've got food", she said, as she went to our pantry and opened the door. "Here's some", and she grabbed several cans of vegetables. "Well," my wife tried to explain to her, "Loveness lives a long, long ways away, in Africa." Grace didn't let up. "We could put it on an airplane and get it to her." And so in Grace's mind the problem was justly handled.

It was simple arithmetic to her: Loveness was hungry + we had food and the means to get it to her = No Problem. It's hard to argue with a child's simple (and honest) logic.

Many (most?) of the problems of our world, our

country, our local communities, our churches and yes also our own lives are really not that complex, if we just had the simple, generous, practical spirit of a child. (Think of the oh-so-near possibility of wiping out polio in the entire world, except for the "complexities" of war and hatred in Pakistan, Afghanistan and Nigeria that continue to proliferate its seed.) Simply God put us in this world to be God's instruments, and so has given each of us the means to be God's blessing to others. (II Corinthians 9:11— "You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and ... your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God.") IT IS as simple as that. We are the ones who want to make it complex and so difficult.

Mother Teresea once said, "I am a little pencil in the hand of a writing God who is sending a love letter to the world." Not the author, just the instrument. It's as simple as that. "Problems" result when we try to be more than we are (like play the role of God).

N. T. Wright described our role in God's plan in this way:

But what we can and must do in the present, if we are obedient to the gospel, if we are following Jesus, and if we are indwelt, energized, and directed by the Spirit, is to build for the kingdom. This brings us back to I Corinthians 15:58 once more: what you do in the Lord is not in vain. You are not oiling the wheels of a machine that's about to roll over a cliff. You are not restoring a great painting that's shortly going to be thrown in a fire. You are not planting roses in a garden that's about to be dug up for a building site. You are---strange though it may seem, almost as hard to believe as the resurrection itself--accomplishing something that will be come in due course part of God's new world. Every act of love, gratitude, and kindness; every work of art or music inspired by the love of God and delight in the beauty of his creation; every minute spent teaching a severely handicapped child to read or walk; every act of care and nurture, of comfort and support, for one's fellow human being and for that matter one's fellow nonhuman (cont'd)

creatures; and of course every prayer, all Spirit-led teaching, every deed that spread the gospel, building up the church, embraces and embodies holiness rather than corruption, and makes the name of Jesus honored in the world—all of this will finds its way, through the resurrecting power of God, into the new creation that God will one day make. That is the logic of the mission of God." (Surpised by Hope, p. 208)

Simple arithmetic: "Loveness is hungry + we have food and the means to get it to her = Problem Solved". Even a child knows that, and at times teaches us that. "Go and do likewise," Jesus urges us (Luke 10:37c).
