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Update from Mutare; Newsletter November 2013

Dear friends and family,

Greetings once more from Mutare, Zimbabwe!!

Happy Thanksgiving! Yesterday I felt like a turkey on Thanksgiving morning after supervising (the word used here is invigilate) a three-hour exam in Human Resource Management in an extremely hot room. The feverish writing of the students must have contributed to the already scorching temperature.

Most people have jobs that, at least once in awhile, cause them to ask, 'WHAT am I DOING here?' Jane and I are blessed to be serving where those thoughts are far out-numbered by the opposite feeling... *'Thank you , Lord that You have called us to be here... and we are actually PAID for doing this???'*

We are not allowed to invigilate our own exams, so usually have not a clue on how to help students with questions other than clerical issues. As a result, we have plenty of time during the exam to think about not only what we are doing, but also what the students are doing. We are exposed to the full spread of college majors, which gives us a better appreciation of the training and preparation going on here at Africa University.

Like many teachers, we are privileged to have frequent doses of positive reinforcement from former students who have gone on to use their training here to make an impact. Facebook and email both make it easy to keep in touch with graduates, and remind us of what we are doing:

Zimbabwe news

Yogi Berra once said, "Half the lies they tell about me aren't true." Zimbabwe is usually wrongly portrayed by the press as a very unsafe destination, and many people have not come as a result- even after reassurances from us and others that the situation here is OK.

We have been delighted to see many visitors

here at AU this year, including a large group from Larry's home state of Iowa. The lowans, and a group from upper New York, were here in July at election time, which was non-violent (although some disputed the results that saw President Robert Mugabe re-elected.) I believe that both groups had wonderful experiences here, but also gained a better understanding of the tensions under which we live during such times.

Campus news

A highlight of the long break was helping one of the Agriculture students succeed in jumping through all the hoops so that he could do a summer internship on a farm in Illinois. Theoneste is from Rwanda, but came to AU via the Tongogara Refugee camp not far from here. The Wright family were a good fit- hard-working yet fun-loving and generous, and they made him feel a part of the family. Theo came back to do his final year glowing, full of ideas, and even more determined to succeed. The Wrights, in turn, gained many new perspectives from Theo, and have the satisfaction of knowing that they have really made a difference.

We are looking for more such opportunities for next summer (May-July). The internship is for ten weeks. If you are at all interested in exploring the possibility of hosting one of our Agriculture students, please email me.

Theo is one of many at AU who would not be here without the help of scholarships. Because of the generosity of people giving to the Advance special and other funds, we were able to accept many first-year students who would otherwise be sitting at home now. We also help many others stay in school when they would have had to drop out otherwise because of changing family circumstances such as illness or death in the family, loss of jobs, etc. Thanks to all who have been part of this! The farm manager continues to push to grow more corn/maize in the summer, and has opened up new fields. Thanks to those who continue to help the farm to improve with this and other projects.

Transforming The World

As I have been in the district meeting with pastors and preachers, checking out churches and worshiping with church folks, I have been encouraged. I'm encouraged because I've seen a lot of people called United Methodists doing some really good things for their community and bringing some good news to a world that seems to only hear bad news.

I'm also encouraged because all the good work isn't done yet!

In *The Externally Focused Church*, the reading this month for HCI, authors Rick Rusaw and Eric Swanson challenge the church to put energy into getting our congregations out in the community, so that the good news we have isn't trapped inside the church walls. They recommend meeting intentionally with community leaders and residents to ask what their hopes and dreams are for their town and neighborhoods. So far they have never heard anyone yet say, "Well, we'd really like to see more drug use, more liquor stores, an increased dropout rate, plummeting test scores, more homelessness and [more] pollution."¹ Instead, they often find that the hopes and dreams of the community intersect with God desires for healthy communities as found in Isaiah 65: public celebrations and happiness; public health for children and the aged; housing for all; food for all; family support systems; absence of violence.²

Where the desires of God for the community intersect with the dreams and hopes of the city—this is the unique place for the church to step out in service! This is the place where we quit talking about our mission statement: "To make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world" and we start living it, working with our community leaders, organizations and residents, helping our communities to be better, safer, healthier places than they were before. Service in



our communities not only transforms our places and structures, but also our relationships with the people who actually live in our neighborhoods. This fall, as pastors and congregations begin to work on their ministry plans and goals for the upcoming year, every UMC in the Iowa Annual Conference will be asked to identify one ministry focus outside the walls of the church building and then be able to share within our cluster conferences how the world is better because of this ministry focus. In other words, have our disciples been out transforming the world in a real, tangible way? Is it good news for the town that the church exists?

As a possibility to get this process started, perhaps your congregation might seek out seek out the leaders of your community and existing organizations: the volunteer fire department, the school superintendent and teachers, city council, local pre-schools, the county sheriff's office, social workers, librarians, and ask: "What are your hopes and dreams for this community?"

Then, follow up with the more powerful question: "How can we partner with you, support you, or offer a supplement so that your work of making the community better might go farther?"

Imagine what kinds of relationships might spring up or be strengthened if we disciple folks—as the project of entire congregations!-- went intentionally out of our way to become partners with our communities. Imagine what kinds of good news we might share, just by caring enough to care about the good work that is already happening. I look forward to walking with you as we continue to live into the mission of making disciples and transforming the world.

Mr. Jones, you haven't seen the room; just wait.'

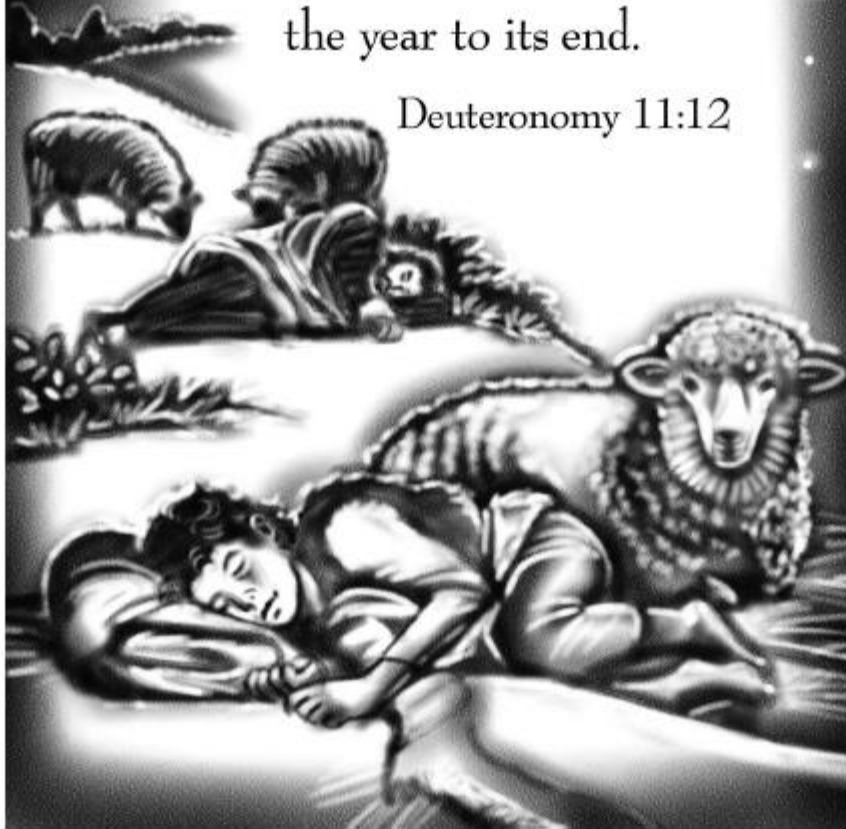
