Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

March 22, Confirmation Sunday, was

The service for confirmation is called a "Covenant Service." This is because during the service promises are made. God promises to accept us, love us and forgive us. The Confirmands promise they will put their whole trust in the grace of Jesus Christ and serve Him as their Lord. The four youth also made the promise to faithfully participate in the ministries of our church by their prayers, their presence, their gifts, their service, and their witness

The parents and the congregation made promises as well. They promised to pray for the youth and nurture them in their faith.

The congregation welcomed the new members by sharing the following words:

We give thanks for all that God has given you and we welcome you in Christian love. #### Update from Mutare Larry and Jane Kies Newsletter March 2015

All nations whom You have made shall come and worship before You, O Lord, and shall glorify Your name. Psalm 86:9

Dear friends and family -- Greetings from Mutare, Zimbabwe!!

#### January Disease

Several weeks ago we had some friends over for a meal and it was jokingly commented that the roasted fivepound (2.2 kg) chicken had grown so large because of 'January Disease'.

No, don't worry for our health- the meat was fine. The school year here in Zimbabwe starts in January, and parents with school-age children often have to scramble to find money for uniforms, fees, pens and pencils etc. Plus, especially in the rural and peri-urban areas, at that time the corn (maize) needs a fix of nitrogen fertilizer... again costing money.

All of this coming so soon after Christmas means that discretionary spending is very limited, and so business is very slow for many stores...thus, what is known locally as 'January Disease'.

With fewer customers for our January production (we receive 2000 every fortnight), the birds spent a bit longer in the house than we like, and just kept growing.

We are reminded of how procuring even the basics is a struggle for many here, and how scholarship

assistance is a lifeline for some of our best students (like Confidence, in the picture, holding two chicks destined for the pot in six weeks).

#### **Evangelizing Africa and Beyond**

In February, pastors and lay leaders (including A.U. alumni) from many African countries, and some from the USA, met on the Africa University campus and reflected on Jesus' words, "Go and tell (John the Baptist) what you hear and see... The blind see, ..... the poor have the Gospel preached to them." They shared accounts of what is happening in their own churches, and received



teaching to challenge and inspire them in their common goal of making disciples. We felt privileged to meet and hear influential and gifted pastors from so many countries.

We read in Psalm 86: "All nations whom You have made shall come and worship before you, O Lord, and shall glorify Your name." We often have that exciting experience here on campus where young people from over 25 nations live and learn together. Bible study and worship in this setting always bring surprises and we find ourselves thinking, "I had never looked at it quite that way before."

Especially exciting is seeing some of our own graduates following the command to 'Go and make disciples.'

Five of our students (four are in the picture with us on graduation night last June) left for the Philippines shortly after the picture was taken for training as Young Missionaries in the 'Generation



Transformation' program initiated by Global Ministries. A number from the D.R.C. who passed through the Intensive English program here several years ago are now in ministry in different countries around the world.

Of course, not all of our graduates end up on other continents, or working for the church . Most return to their home countries in Africa in a variety of positions- as translators, youth directors, teachers, health workers, leaders and executives, pastors, agricultural advisors and producers. Africa University is indeed a unique and strategic place for receiving, training and sending people out to learn and report 'what they hear and see' Jesus doing among the nations.

#### Farm News

The irrigation expansion was finally finished, and we now have an additional 60 acres (25 Ha) which we can irrigate. Some of the first crops in those fields are now nearing harvest time- Praise the Lord! In line with our determination to follow the slogan, 'Don't just work hard...work SMART!' one focus this year is to be sure all of our land preparation equipment is doing the job. After seeing a demonstration of its effectiveness, we hope to buy a vibrating cultivator (pictured) which

will make a better seedbed and improve germination and emergence. Estimated cost is \$9,000.

As parents, we are thankful not only for their success but that they have deep bonds as siblings- strong enough to survive even a very competitive game of "Settlers of Catan".

#### March 2015 School Teachers for Nigeria

We're CELEBRATNG! Yes, after a 25 year partnership with the UMC in Nigeria, we Iowans will celebrate on Monday, June 8 at our Annual Conference in De Moines. If not a delegate to this event, YOU are invited to join us at 8:30 AM for the opening African worship service and then the celebration presentation. Plan to stroll through the Nigerian Picture Walk, visit the village hut and see the farm and cooking wares and then attend the celebration dinner at 5:30 PM at First UMC in downtown Des Moines. Keep watching for more details on this momentous event in the history of the Iowa Conference. YOU made mission happen so now celebrate!

After the signing of the partnership by both the Iowa and Nigerian Conferences, we lowans were asked to help the Nigerian church with the restart of educational ministries. The Nigerian Government had taken over the church run schools during the oil glut in the 1970's but when the funds started drying up the church was allowed to offer schooling for children and youth. The first project was the construction of a Nursery/Primary School, Grades 3-6 and the when a large section of land was given the church, a secondary school was plan, constructed and now functioning. The former Des Moines District paid for the "Little Red Schoolhouse" building and the Fort Dodge and Sioux City Districts raised money for the science building. Now this Junior Secondary School has two streams of classes from Grades 7 – 12.

Progress is being made on the Banyam Theological Seminary campus in Bambur, Nigeria! With a grant from the General Board of Higher Education and Ministries and a substantial gift from an Iowa donor, Provost John Pena went to Abuja to receive solar panels/batteries from Germany for the electrification of the BTS campus. Provost Pena negotiated with former German missionary friends to assist in the purchase of the necessary solar equipment and the shipment of this equipment to Nigeria. Once out of customs it was taken to Bambur for installation. With several buildings including the administration building, library, Streyffeler Chapel, student and staff housing areas, it may take more solar panels to light up ALL the campus but LIGHT

#### there is!

Yahuda Zailani is now writing chapter 6 of his dissertation at Africa University with plans to graduate on June 13 with a Master's Degree and then return back to Nigeria where he will resume his teaching assignment at BTS. He needs funds to purchase a one way airline ticket and a Kindle for teaching purposes. Wouldn't it be nice to give him a monetary graduation gift? He is grateful and appreciative of your support during his two year study period.

After two years at Simpson College Ishaya David is also planning to travel back to his home in Gombe where his mother and brothers live. There are increased incidents with the Boko Haram terrorizing this area so let's pray the situation settles down and Ishaya feels safe on this visit.
