

Dear friends and family, Greetings from Mutare, Zimbabwe!!

The cover article in the May 2014 issue of National Geographic magazine is about food. The author highlights the estimate that world crop production needs to double by the year 2050 to meet increased demands. To achieve this, farmers need to work not just hard but smart- using more efficient practices, improved varieties, even new crops that are better adapted to local environments than traditional ones.



As part of her Honors degree in Crop Production, Grace Dondo (above) did a research project. She worked with a local seed company to successfully screen varieties of soybean for resistance to soybean rust, the most devastating disease of the crop. Farmers without the resources to spray against rust will find such resistant varieties the difference between a profitable crop of soybeans...and disaster.

Grace was able to attend Africa University through the help of several scholarship programs. The cover of National Geographic is not genuine-but Grace's desire to make a positive impact on food production on her home continent is. We felt blessed... but please don't feel deprived if your pastor can't fix your car!

the havoc the disease can wreck when we could not spray in time.

The Farm Development fund continues to provide funds for projects that help make the farm more efficient, including concrete slabs in front of the broiler house doors that are a big aid to biosecurity. Current projects are an improved wastedisposal system at the dairy and continued expansion of the irrigation system- so that we can work hard and smart. A BIG thanks to those who help!



Decriminalization of HIV (SF2297) *Approve*

Restoring Persons to Community: We support the Decriminalization of HIV so that those who have this disease will not also bear the added burden of being labeled criminals. The progress in the last 30 years to control HIV, allowing people to live long and productive lives free of AIDS, makes it imperative that the fears which created the crime of HIV be put aside. We urge the support of SF2297 as a wise and prudent step in restoring persons with HIV to community.

Background: Iowa Code 709C summary: A person commits criminal transmission of the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) if the person, knowing that his or her HIV status is positive, engages in intimate contact with another person. Exposing someone to HIV, whether or not the virus is transmitted, is a class B felony with sentencing up to 25 years in prison. There is no evidence that 709C is an effective deterrent, and it may actually deter people from getting tested for HIV because (1) they assume (wrongly) their intimate partners would have told them, or for those who do not know whether or not they have HIV do not get tested because knowing they test positive makes them liable for being charged. (You cannot be charged under this code if you do not know your status.)

When this law was conceived the knowledge about HIV, how it was transmitted and how it could be treated were all very different from today's world. It is still a very serious health issue. HIV is the virus that can lead to acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS). Unlike some other viruses, the

human body cannot get rid of HIV. That means that once you have HIV, you have it for life. As of December 2006, according to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates, more than one million people in the United States were infected with HIV. One-quarter of these were unaware of their status! There is no cure for AIDS. Approximately 56,300 new HIV infections occur each year:

(www.cdc.gov/hiv/surveillance/resources/reports/2008 report/)

When someone is purposely trying to infect another with the disease, there needs to be legal consequences. However, treatment of HIV has progressed so much in the last 30 years that, when they receive the proper treatment, someone diagnosed at age 25 has nearly the same life expectancy as an unaffected person. If HIV is treated effectively, it does not become AIDS.

Public Health Education and Prevention: "HIV prevention and treatment, substance abuse prevention, and sexually transmitted disease treatment and prevention services must be better integrated...—first, to help uninfected people stay that way; second, to help infected people stay healthy; and third, to help infected individuals initiate and sustain behaviors that will keep themselves safe and prevent transmission to others." (United Methodist Book of Resolutions, 2012, "A Covenant to Care: HIV/AIDS in the USA" page 364.)

SF2297 changes 709C so that it encourages safe practices to prevent the spread of HIV and early diagnosis of HIV. We urge its support.

JULY SCHOOL TEACHERS FOR NIGERIA

In Nigeria:

The rainy season has started.

Banyam Theological Seminary will be dismissing for mid year break.

Junior Secondary School will graduate 38 students on July 12.

The North Conference is trying to raise \$3,125 to begin construction on a new Nursery/Primary School. The present building is a one large auditorium size room, no separating walls, a dirt floor, no electricity, crooked wooden windows...a pathetic sight but faithful teachers teach making the best of the situation and children learn by the rote method.

SALADUNA, KUKU KWACHA & HAKURI

Strange names! Each of these Nigerian villages is the location of literacy programs sponsored by the Lit-Lit program of the Central Conference United Methodist Church. Ahmadu Maidoki, the Literacy Director, visits almost inaccessible villages where there are no schools for anyone, 95% of the people are illiterate, superstitious and don't understand the need for education. His question is "How will these people grow spiritually?"

In places like Saladuna, literacy teachers are sent to enroll learners with great success. Classes are set up for adult learners using a blackboard under a tree with their school supplies being their finger and sand. Simple reading, basic arithmetic and printing letters are all taught along with Bible reading. Upon completion of the Lit-Lit course, the most sought after item is a Bible in the Hausa language for the students to own and read. Bibles may be purchased


for about \$8 in Nigeria.

Ahmadu Maidoki says" May the Lord give us spirit in decreasing the number of illiterates for the Glory of God." Through support of the Lit-Lit program idol worshipers or animists will come to know Jesus Christ and souls will be saved!

How can we make that happen? Your support may be sent through your local church to the Conference Treasurer marked; INP, #230, Lit Lit. We who have been educated know the importance of learning!

Uzajja Dauda, one of the Banyam Theological Seminary faculty, will be traveling to Abuja to get his Zimbabwe visa in preparation for flying to Zimbabwe where he will attend Africa University getting a Master's Degree. We are short about \$1,500 to pay his tuition, books and school fees so if you are willing to help with his continuing education, see paragraph above about sending money. He's thrilled and I'm excited for him to have this educational opportunity, thanks to you lowans.

Our love story between Carolyn Carter, from Wilton but who had been an individual volunteer teaching at the Junior Secondary School in Jalingo, and Ezekiel Gwi, who arrived in the U.S., has a U.S. driver's license and is getting his social security number. Their wedding is August 9 in MN.
