Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Although the secular Christmas season started before Halloween, in the church calendar the season began on November 30, the first Sunday of Advent. Advent is a season of four weeks including four Sundays. Advent derives from the Latin adventus, which means "coming." During this time, we are called to prepare for the celebration of our Savior's birth. We are also called to think about how we are preparing for the time when Christ will come again. While the secular world prepares for our Savior's birth by shopping, wrapping gifts, baking, decorating, attending parties, followers of Jesus Christ are called to more or maybe I should say less —less meaning less time and energy and money spent on things that in the light of eternity do not really matter. More meaning more time spent in preparing our hearts to receive Christ anew. I know we are often times torn between both worlds. Before Jesus was crucified, he prayed for his disciples. While the saying is old and maybe even over used, the saying Jesus is the Reason for the Season still holds true. I read a short story years ago titled, Whose Birthday Is It Anyway? It was a reminder to me that this season is all about the gift of Jesus to a world desperately in need of love and forgiveness. Whatever our preparations are for this season, may we, above all, honor our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.



UMC #GivingTuesday Shows the Strength of a Denomination United -

United Methodists once again responded with extravagant generosity on UMC #GivingTuesday. On December 2, 2014, more than \$2.5 million was donated online through The Advance to support mission and ministries around the world.

The denomination's General Board of Global Ministries matched the first \$1 million in gifts to help build excitement and leverage donations.

More than 770 projects and missionaries received more 8,700 gifts through UMC #GivingTuesday. The response was global with donors from 25 countries giving generously. The Advance is the designated giving channel of the United Methodist Church.

Noting that donors can partner with Advance projects and missionaries throughout the year, Thomas Kemper, who leads Global Ministries, said, "Having one day when United Methodists from around the world are united around giving shows the strength of the denomination's connection, while strengthening the impact of the gifts to each ministry."

He continued, "Every gift made through The Advance this season makes a difference in the lives of the people they touch."

The projects and missionaries supported through The Advance were key to the success of UMC #GivingTuesday. According to the head of The Advance, Ellen Knudsen, "The relationships our projects have with churches and individuals generated excitement for supporting specific ministries."

This is the second year that The Advance participated in UMC #GivingTuesday, part of a larger international movement that provides an alternative to the shopping traditions following Thanksgiving—Black Friday, Local Business Saturday and Cyber Monday. According to Mashable, the number of nonprofits that received an online donation this year on #GivingTuesday increased 15 percent from 2013, while the total number of transactions was up 50 percent.

The United Methodist Church has become a model for other organizations wanting to participate in the larger #GivingTuesday campaign. Global Ministries was among the partners invited to the White House by the Office of Social Innovation and Civic Partnership on Oct. 6 to promote and support #GivingTuesday. And an article in USA Today highlighted The United Methodist Church among the significant participants, reporting, "Big names—Microsoft to United Methodist General Board of Global Ministries and PayPal—got involved this year with promises to match donations."

Denominational agencies such as The General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, General Board of Discipleship, Commission on Religion and Race, and United Methodist Communications united to help promote giving through The Advance on UMC #GivingTuesday.

Emily Miller, Global Ministries' associate general secretary for Communications and Development, said she is thrilled about the creative ways diverse groups participated in #GivingTuesday and about how United Methodist organizations got involved.

"For example," she said, "Cokesbury and the United Methodist Publishing House pledged a portion of the day's sales to Advance projects, and our colleagues at United Methodist Communications helped answer donor questions through Infoserve."

She added, "We know that the giving on December 2 will have a ripple effect throughout the season as people look for ways to stay focused on the spirit of giving."
