Cans for Vacation Bible School







Your caring support allows our organization to provide the most basic human services of food, shelter and clothing to the hundreds of homeless individuals and families who seek assistance at the Siena/Francis House every day.

For your information, the Siena/Francis House is currently providing overnight accommodations to well over 500 women, children and men each and every night. And, our kitchen staff is prepared to serve more than 1,500 meals every day, to feed each one of them.

Please know that our organization has been providing our services to the homeless in record numbers. In:2014, the Siena/Francis House provided exactly 188,000 overnight stays and served 459,993 meals both record numbers for our shelter or for any shelter in the state. These compare to 2013 year-end numbers, when we provided 180,386 overnight stays and served 421,138 meals.

Please also know that I fully appreciate the fact that the Siena/Francis House is only able to provide our services to the homeless because of the generosity of so many kind and caring persons from our community, like you. Your support makes a real and meaningful difference to the Siena/Francis House, and especially to the homeless families and individuals we serve.

Helping to lead the way

A church that began with only five people on its first Sunday a few years ago as a ministry of Broadway United Methodist Church in Council Bluffs has grown to a worshiping congregation of more than 75.

The church, called Fe y Esperanza, serves a wide region, including people from the Southwest District in Iowa as well as Omaha and Lincoln in Nebraska. "Fe y Esperanza," their pastor, the Rev. Ruben Mendoza, explains, means faith and hope. "Every time people gather they come with faith, and . . . the hope of God is present in church."

The congregation recently gathered for a <u>celebration</u> to mark their move from Broadway UMC across town to Epworth United Methodist Church. Their new home is located in a growing neighborhood of the city, where Latino residents make up more that 65% of the population. An entire floor of Epworth UMC will be dedicated to the ministries of Fe y Esperanza, including Bible studies and community outreach.

This congregation is one of five new communities of faith that are receiving priority support from the Iowa



Conference in 2016. The Standing Committee on

Hispanic Ministries of the Iowa Conference is contributing \$13,000 toward Fe y Esperanza in 2016.

These funds are made available from the apportionment gifts of the United Methodist churches of Iowa.
