


#### Former Student Writes about His First Week at Seminary

## Drake University

The Drake Wesley House is continuing its commitment to fostering new conversations in new places with people (old and new) who are willing to venture to new depths. To that end, we are proud to host Drake's Writers and Critics Series this academic year. Sponsored by the English Department, these programs offer the Drake community an opportunity to explore the rich intersection of word and image. This year's theme, "Where the Verbal Meets the Visual," will bring artists and writers and critics together with readers and seers in a unique environment.

The first event, September 25, will feature writer **Matthew Swanson** and illustrator **Robbie Behr**, cofounders of **Idiot's Books**, a (very) small press that publishes odd, commercially non-viable illustrated books. Like all of the exhibitions hosted by the Wesley House Gallery, the content of the work shown is not necessarily a reflection of the beliefs of the Wesley Foundation, the United Methodist Church, or its acolytes. The Idiot's Books press-release reads, "These books range across subjects from the Christian God to seventh grade, French imperialism to donkey slaughter, and funnel cakes to traffic theory. Usually satirical and often irreverent, the books aim to exploit the possibilities inherent in the quarrel between pictures and words." Their work has been described as "witty, winsome, and original," by book critic Michael Dirda of the Washington Post and as "weird, stupid, and a waste of time," by tenth grade honors student Emily Parsons of Hamilton, Ohio.

Swanson and Behr will offer a 45-minute presentation on building a life as an artist, followed by Q & A and a poster giveaway, September 25, 7pm, Wesley House Gallery.

Other events scheduled in this series are:

**Student Showcase-Critics: Thursday, October 25, 7:00pm, Wesley House.** Student panels on criticism include "Cultural Capital and Comics/Manga/Graphic Novels," "Representations of Gender & Sexuality in Comics," and "Author/Artist Collaborations."

**Drake Writer's Harvest Festival-A Benefit for the Food Bank of Iowa: Thursday, Nov 8, 7:00pm, Wesley House.** The readings at this gathering will be paired with live responses by several visual artists, which will be auctioned after the event. The Writers' Harvest program is the United States' largest literary benefit to fight hunger. Every year, Writers' Harvest readings are hosted at colleges and bookstores nationwide, with proceeds donated to local anti-hunger efforts.
